What is Intelligence Squared?

The UK's leading debate forum

Since 2002, Intelligence Squared (IQ²), the UK's premier forum for debate, has been bringing together the world's leading minds to participate in live public debates.

IQ2 regularly hosts leading authors, journalists, politicians, economists, scientists and philosophers - such as Richard Dawkins, Bernard-Henri Lévy, Karl Rove and Stephen Fry - and asks them to dispute motions on domestic politics, international affairs, media, history, religion, science, the environment and the arts. Within the IQ2 debate format, these speakers bring intellectual rigour and excitement to important topics. Now with branches in New York, Hong Kong, Sydney, Kiev and Melbourne, IQ² is fast becoming a truly global brand, and several of our recent debates were broadcast via BBC World News to an estimated audience of 70 million people.

Introducing IQ² online

Intelligencesquared.com was launched in December 2009 as a multimedia platform for IQ²'s live debate archive. For the first time, seven years of IQ² content was available to a global audience. IQ² has also started to publish online a new series of written debates, which set out all the arguments for and against motions on a wide range of current and historical topics.

Since June 2010 we have been publishing a multimedia magazine, which is released weekly on the Intelligence Squared website encompassing video, audio and written content on the issues that matter around the world.

Premium content

Most of IQ² online is only available to Premium Members. This includes The Magazine, the full back catalogue of video, audio and written debates and access to the live stream of IQ² events. Premium Memberships usually cost £60 per year for individuals, but we are now enabling schools to have Institutional Membership. This will enable students logged in to the school's system to see all premium content on IQ². A selection of published Controversies (to which we are continually adding) is shown on p. 8-9.

Learning through debate

IQ²'s high quality content is an invaluable educational resource for any intellectually curious student at secondary school, or even younger, up to degree level.

The debates are not presented as an encyclopedia like Wikipedia, or in static textbook format, but more like an intellectual boxing match, which pits conflicting points of view against each other. Our intention is to engage students in an issue, rather than impose knowledge. We want to free them up to think critically.

Content you can trust

With so much of the internet a confusing muddle, it can be difficult to find the most reliable educational websites. With carefully selected links to the most relevant videos, books and articles, our website provides a trusted intellectual framework for students to carry out detailed investigations into all sorts of topics. Our written debates come with carefully selected links to the best videos, books and articles. In this way, students can learn about conflicting points of view and discover where to go to find out more.

Debate everything from Churchill to climate change

The IQ² website currently covers a very wide range of issues - many of which relate to the GCSE and A-Level syllabus. Our material is in exciting debate format, and teachers can use these debates to introduce students to a new topic or to help them gain a more advanced understanding of the key issues at hand. Students will be able to see some of the world's best orators defending their positions, thinking on their toes and engaging in real but respectful contest.

Our written, video, and audio content looks at controversial historical reputations, ethical disputes, and scientific questions: we cover topics such as Napoleon's legacy, the West's responsibility to pay for climate change, the successes of democracy in the Middle East, the viability of the EU, animal experiments, and the ongoing war in Afghanistan.

Example uses of IQ² in the classroom

Religious Studies

An RS teacher could use our written debate on the Catholic Church, and then show videos of past debates including 'Atheism is the new fundamentalism' or 'The Catholic Church is a force for good in the world', which pitted Stephen Fry and Christopher Hitchens against Ann Widdecombe and John Onaiyekan, the Archbishop of Abuja. Then a class could watch interviews with Richard Dawkins and the Archbishop of Canterbury.

Science

Pupils learning about climate change could study our lively series of written debates about the strengths and weaknesses of wind turbines, nuclear energy, carbon capture and solar power. A biology class could read about evolution and the battle of ideas between Richard Dawkins and Stephen Jay Gould. We also have a series of engaging interviews about the possibilities of science outside the classroom - on topics like the lunar landings, quantum theory and the world in 2050.

Citizenship

IQ² debates are an invaluable resource for teachers in charge of Citizenship classes at both Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4. Take a look at our written debates, including 'The UN is no longer the guarantor of peace and freedom', 'Europe is failing its Muslims', 'Britain needs a written constitution', 'Faith schools are good for Britain'. Or our live debate videos, such as 'The threat to our civil liberties has been greatly exaggerated', 'The future of parliamentary democracy in Britain', and 'Freedom of expression must include the licence to offend'.

History

A class studying World War II could read our written debate, 'Churchill: Hero or human being?', which examines the legacy of Britain's wartime leader and looks at the criticisms - including the mistakes at Gallipoli, the bombing of Dresden and the betrayal of eastern Europe - that history has levelled at him.

Then they could watch the video of our heated live debate, 'Churchill was more of a liability than an asset to the free world', which featured historians Andrew Roberts, Antony Beevor, Norman Stone and Richard Overy in an impassioned argument, and watch Max Hastings discuss his book on Churchill.
