Food shortages and rationing 2022

If you've seen your local grocery store with empty shelves, you're not alone: Food shortages are still haunting us in 2022. WHY?

"Shortages may depend on where you buy your groceries as there are regional differences in supply. Meat and poultry are in short supply in many



supermarkets. This is due to several factors, with manufacturing plant labour shortages causing most of the issues. Beef will likely see the most shortages because work in beef plants is more labour-intensive, according to Food Business News.

Dairy may be in short supply this year.

A combination of expensive crops to feed livestock and chickens, combined with high transportation costs and shortages of packaging materials (especially plastics) may cause dairy shortages at your local supermarket.

In addition to material shortages, labour shortages may also impact grocery shelves in terms of transportation workers as well as grocery workers to stock the dairy case. As a result, you may have fewer options in terms of your usual purchases of milk, cheese (especially cream cheese), yogurt, and other dairy items.



Sheerness man Tasered and punched by police who unlawfully entered home after RBS eviction order

A man who was Tasered twice and punched in the face by police while trying to defend his home from repossession has been cleared of any wrongdoing.

Bob White, 62, barricaded himself inside his home in Sheerness, when officers, bailiffs and a locksmith arrived with a county court warrant for eviction.





After refusing to answer the front door, police went round the side of the bricklayer's Park Road home and used an enforcer to smash the bottom of a door.

Sgt Russell Balment attempted to enter the house through the gap but quickly recoiled after see ing an "aggressive" looking Mr White with a large "wooden club", which he claimed the defendant was swinging at him.

After being told "get out of my house" by Mr White, PC Dunn, who was assisting Sgt Balment, pulled out his Taser and used it twice.

Officers then stormed the property where they subdued Mr White, punching him in the head twice in the process, and arrested him on suspicion of affray.

Police unlawfully enter Bob White's Sheerness home after tasering him

During the hearing at Maidstone Crown Court, judge David Griffith-Jones QC found police had entered the defendant's home unlawfully and Sgt Balment was essentially a "trespasser and unwelcome intruder".

Addressing the jury, made up of six women and six men, he said: "Sgt. Balment gave evidence that he thought had authority to enter, but he didn't.

"His entry was unlawful and he was therefore a trespasser and unwelcome intruder." It doesn't matter that he was a police officer.

"The defendant knew he was a police officer, but he was not required to tolerate unlawful entry." To an Englishman a home is like his castle and he was entitled to force him out with reasonable force."

COMMON LAW COURS

Over a two-day hearing the court heard how Mr White had a wooden antique which he had picked up when he heard smashing at the side of his house. But he denied swinging it at the police officer, claiming Sgt Balment had "made up" the claims.

The jury were shown body-worn footage from police which showed the altercation from February 2019, including a blooded Mr White being arrested.

Judge Griffith-Jones told the jury they needed to decide whether Mr White threatened violence to Sgt Balment, whether the force he used was unreasonable, and whether a person at the scene would have feared for their safety.

In his closing argument to the jury prosecuting lawyer Ian Foinette said the situation was a "world away" from an intruder breaking into your house in the night and Mr White knew police were trying to get into his home.

He said: "It was obvious he didn't think Sgt Balment was an intruder. "It doesn't give him the right to behave like that and swing a club round."

Mr White, who was representing himself, told the jury: "My life has been on hold for three years while this came to court. It's been like a prison sentence itself.

"It's a final chance for me to get justice.

"PC Dunn Tasered me twice and I was punched in the face twice before being handcuffed."

When reading the facts of the case Judge Griffith-Jones highlighted how Mr White didn't strike or touch any of the police officers, who were left "without a scratch", and said the incident was "over in an instant".

He explained Mr White wanted to contest the warrant for possession order issued by his mortgage owner RBS.

The jury returned a unanimous verdict of not guilty after 40 minutes of deliberation.

More than 20 supporters attended Mr White's trial and clapped the judge out of the court.

Speaking outside the court Mr White said justice had been done and explained he went through the ordeal for his wife who died shortly after the incident.

He added: "I went through this for all the other people who are being wrongfully evicted by police.

"I hope this sets a precedent for other people to challenge unlawful evictions.

"It's not just a physical struggle for people facing similar circumstances to me, but a mental one. People in the same situation have ended up killing themselves over the stress from it.

"I just hope this case will help someone in the same situation as me. The officers and police need to be held to account for this."

Police bodycam footage shows the "wooden club" Bob White had to protect himself

A police spokesman said: "On February 5, 2019, Kent Police officers attended an address in Park Road, Sheerness to assist bailiffs with a civil dispute and the repossession of a property.

"Entry was forced and a man alleged to have been in possession of a weapon was arrested on suspicion of affray. He was later charged and a trial took place at Maidstone Crown Court.

"During the trial the prosecution was unable to produce the original warrant to enter the premises and the judge directed the jury that the officers had entered without legal authority.

"On Wednesday March 23, the defendant was found not guilty on all counts."





CLC Health Regulatory Body

Given the failings in the existing healthcare system, we are now in the process of setting up a CLC Health Regulatory Body. All existing qualifications from within the statutory system will be honoured under common law, this in turn will allow healthcare workers to carry out the same work under.

This code of practice will apply internationally and will be monitored by a controlling body of health professionals.

WHO and Global Vaccine Passports

The World Health Organization (WHO) has contracted German-based Deutsche Telekom subsidiary T-Systems to develop a global vaccine passport system, with plans to link every person on the planet to a QR code digital ID.

Indeed, despite the minuscule threat posed by new variants and dubious-at-best vaccine efficacy, the WHO is adamant that a global QR code-based vaccine passport system is vital for all future health emergencies, not just COVID.

It should be noted that besides the immoral implications of implementing health-based restrictions in the wake of future pandemics — whether they be COVID, polio, or anything else — a global vaccine passport also brings up national security concerns, as the WHO and its backers would have access to these "home-based records."

T-Systems has a lot of experience developing discriminatory health apps, having worked to create Germany's Corona-Warn-App tracing and Europe's vaccine passport.

Moreover, as reported by The Counter Signal, the push for a global vaccine passport coincides with the WHO's drafting of a global pandemic treaty, which would legally bind member states to the WHO's International Health Regulations and allow the organization to dictate all future pandemic responses, utterly quashing national health sovereignty.

The WHO began drafting its treaty in December 2021 during a special session entitled "The World Together."

The treaty is to be upheld by the WHO's constitution, which under Article 19 "[provides] the World Health Assembly with the authority to adopt conventions or agreements on any matter within WHO's competence."

Additionally, as pointed out by MP Leslyn Lewis, the treaty would also allow the WHO to determine what is a pandemic and when one is occurring, even over something non-viral like an obesity crisis. This would effectively give the organization the authority to take control of member states' healthcare systems whenever they feel necessary.

Central Bank Plan to Control Our Spending

What else will be linked into global vaccine passport system? Central bank digital currencies will control all our spending.

G7 Finance Ministers and Central Bank Governors' Statement on Central Bank Digital Currencies (CBDCs) and Digital Payments – 13 October 2021 1. Innovation in digital money and payments has the potential to bring significant benefits but also raises considerable public policy and regulatory issues. Strong international coordination and cooperation on these issues helps to ensure that public and private sector innovation will deliver domestic and cross-border benefits while being safe for users and the wider financial system. 2. We have been exploring in our jurisdictions how digital innovation could maintain access to, and enhance the benefits of, central bank money in the form of Central Bank Digital Currencies (CBDCs). If issued, a CBDC would complement cash? Is this not a contradiction? and could act as a liquid, safe settlement asset and as an anchor for the payments system.

G7 finance ministries and central banks are publishing Public Policy Principles for Retail CBDCs, to support and inform domestic policy and design deliberations within and beyond the G7. This work complements the recently published work led by a group of central banks, and the Bank for International Settlements, to explore CBDC design, operation and the implications for monetary and financial stability.

G7 authority has yet taken the sovereign decision to issue a CBDC and careful consideration of the potential policy implications will continue. 3. We reaffirm that any CBDC should be grounded in our long-standing public commitments to transparency, the rule of law and sound economic governance.

Any CBDC must support, and 'do no harm' to, the ability of central banks to fulfil their mandates for monetary and financial stability. We emphasise the importance of rigorous standards of privacy, accountability for the protection of users' data, and transparency on how information will be secured and used, to command trust and confidence by users.

implementation of the G20 Roadmap to enhance cross-border payments, and welcome the quantitative global targets that have been set recently for addressing the challenges of cost, speed, transparency and access by 2027. 4 We commit to delivering necessary enhancements to existing systems and leveraging innovative solutions where appropriate; a greater focus on cross-border interoperability, and ensuring that the public and private sector work together effectively.
